Schultz moved to Lake Wylie more than two years, but the photo came from work in Gainesville, Fla. He's a graphic designer with about 30 years experience behind a camera. The Autumn Cove resident snapped the photo with his first digital camera. He wasn't using high-end light. The image came out much better than he'd anticipated.

"It was a good capture," he said. "It was probably a lot of luck."

Schultz views and submits work to several photography websites. Response to the would-be cover, with the model coming through the dark with a black background, prompted his entry.

"Since everybody seems to like it, why don't I go with this one, and we'll just see what happens?" Schultz said.

In addition to national photography and graphics work, Schultz creates local projects from his home studio.



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About The Shot

Story Behind the Shot:

Reflection was shot in my home studio back in 2009. I was playing with this effect that I had created, using Photoshop, Corel Photo Paint and Paint Shop Pro. It was a wet chrome look that I was applying to the human form, kind of a "Silver Surfer" look. While I was shooting with the model, I decided that I wanted to try this effect on her; I wanted her to look like she was part of, or coming through, glass. I posed her

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on a wooden crate looking over her shoulder and brushing her hair (as if she was looking into a mirror). I then shot the mirror at the same angle using the same white backdrop. I then combined the two using different effects.

Equipment:

Canon EOS 5D, Norman lighting, two umbrellas.



Gear Head

I just read the Mod of the Month article with the 2008 Yamaha R1. The 50-100 MPH third gear roll-on test shows a .4 second improvement with a +2 rear sprocket change. Have you guys ever done a roll-on test of a bike with both a +2 front and -2 rear sprocket change? I'm mostly curious in acceleration in the 60-160 range. As an owner of a Hayabusa with a -2 rear sprocket change, my bike feels like it accelerates a bit more quickly in that range, but I don't know for sure since taller gearing is supposed to reduce acceleration.

Adding teeth up front and subtracting teeth off the rear just gears the bike taller, making acceleration slower but top speed potentially higher. Not sure how it could possibly feel "foster," Also. we can't imagine why you'd put a -2 spracket on a streetbike, particularly a 'Busa.
